## Director's Briefing

Dear Colleagues,

July 2018

It is hard to believe that the end of another academic year is fast approaching. So much has taken place over the last ten months and the Education team have been so privileged to have been part of many special events, projects and achievements across our church schools. It was my aim, in taking up my post at the start of the school year, to visit as many of our schools in the Diocese to see this work first hand. It has been a real delight to see such wonderful work and the strong Christian ethos that is at the heart of the education that we provide for our pupils and students. Despite my best efforts, I'm afraid that I have only achieved visits to just over a third of schools and so I look forward to making up for this and visiting many more of you in my second year.

Whilst not making so many individual visits to schools, it has been hugely valuable to meet with headteachers through our Anglican Heads' Cluster meetings. This has enabled us to share important information and the latest developments and policy from both the Board of Education and the Church of England Education Office. I am excited to develop this work further with each of the 11 clusters in the coming year, as each group determines how it wishes to work together to share the very best practice within our schools.


This year has also seen the launch of a new and enhanced Family of Schools offer for 2018/19, which has come in direct response to requests from schools for greater access from the Diocese to school improvement and training. Initial interest in the enhanced offer has been very positive and, if successful, we plan to expand our team of headteacher consultants for the second year. This has also seen an extended training programme for NQTs and RQTs, as well as a Middle Leader course that reflects the principles and structure of the very popular and successful Christian Leadership course and an increased number of governor courses. We also hope to launch our Headteacher Well-Being programme at the start of the autumn. All of this is a further indication of our commitment to supporting leadership at all levels across our schools.

As we come towards the end of the school year, we will be saying good-bye to our pupils in Year 6, Year 11 and Year 13, as they prepare to move on to new schools, new pastures and new opportunities. At the same time, we will also be saying goodbye to several of our headteachers, senior leaders, teaching staff and support staff who are either moving on to new posts or retiring. We are hugely grateful and appreciative of the contribution each has made in their time in our church schools and pray that they go with God's blessing, as we wish them well in their future endeavours.

We will also be saying good-bye to a member of our team, as Jill Kelly, Deputy Director of Education has decided to take early retirement at the end of the school year. I have included a separate thank you below acknowledging Jill's contribution to our Diocesan schools during her twelve years' service. I would also like to take the opportunity to thank each member of our existing team, Sue, Charlotte, Sandra and Sandra for their continued hard work and support throughout the year in what at times have been quite a challenge.

Finally, can I thank you and your staff, governors and families for everything that you have collectively contributed to enhance the Christian education of all of our pupils during this school year. I wish each of you a restful and relaxing summer break and look forward to working with you on a range of exciting projects and initiatives planned for the coming year.

# Director's Briefing Staff News

## Ms Jill Kelly, Deputy Director of Education



As indicated above, this summer we will be saying good-bye to Ms Jill Kelly, one of our Deputy Directors of Education. Jill is well known to many of our schools and has been part of our Diocesan Education team for nearly twelve years.

During this time, Jill has taken a key lead in school effectiveness and our CPD programme, with the children always being at the heart of her work. This has seen Jill work with many talented and dedicated colleagues, providing support that has included mentoring and pastoral work. Under Jill's leadership our School Improvement work has grown, working alongside colleagues from our Local Authorities, Ofsted and the RSC team. More recently, this has seen the creation of our Headteacher Consultants, who will be providing school improvement support from next year.

Jill has particularly championed the Christian Leadership programme, delivered in conjunction with the five North-West dioceses. Jill has been instrumental in developing this course which has seen over 100 delegates from Chester Diocese renewing their desire to serve God as school leaders, but also often as part of their own personal faith journey. Another highlight has seen the creation and development of special groups, in particular a group focussing on disadvantage, which Jill was instrumental in setting up. This has seen colleagues and schools from across the diocese to come together to share expertise and knowledge particularly in relation to supporting disadvantaged pupils.

Reflecting on her time with the diocese, Jill has provided her own personal message of thanks,

*At Church House, I have had the great pleasure of working with a small team of great individuals, along with diocesan consultants, who work tirelessly to always put children and schools first. # Annual Headteacher & Senior Leaders Conference

Thursday 22nd – Friday 23rd November 2018 - The Park Royal Hotel, Stretton, Warrington

With our church schools surrounded by an ever-changing educational landscape and pressures from differing views of society there has never been a more important time for brave leaders within our schools.

The main conference day (23<sup>rd</sup> November) is designed to support church school leaders as they consider this within their own context and that of the wider church school family. This year we are offering a residential option with a twilight session the night before starting at 4:30pm led by Bishop Libby, followed by evening worship and a conference dinner. Our keynote speakers on the main conference day will be Bishop Stephen Cottrell, Bishop of Chelmsford and Will Ryan of 'Independent Thinking.' There will also be the opportunity to attend workshops on the new SIAMS framework, Valuing All God's Children and Dealing with difficult circumstances as a church school leader.

## Family of Schools Offer 2018/19

In response to requests from our headteachers we are pleased to be able to offer an enhanced service as part of the Family of Schools that will include bespoke school support and school improvement partners, whilst retaining the current offer. The existing family of schools' offer is now called the Family of Schools 'core offer,' with a new level of support being offered for next year called the Family of Schools 'enhanced offer.' This is available in three forms; -

### Enhanced Offer – Complete

- School Improvement Partner (3 x ½ day sessions – termly)
- Bespoke School Improvement support (3 x ½ day sessions)
- Headteacher Performance Management

### Enhanced Offer – SIP

- School Improvement Partner (3 x ½ day sessions – termly)

### Enhanced Offer – Bespoke Support

- Bespoke School Improvement support (3 x ½ day sessions)

In addition, each of the enhanced offers also include;

- 20 x ½ day sessions priority places on DBE Training courses
- Reduced fees for any additional school support and training
- All services included in the core offer

# CPD & Training Programme 2018/19



Booking for our programme of training and courses for 2018/19 will be made available before the end of term. The range of courses have been extended from this year and will include CPD opportunities for all levels of leadership, including governance. We will also be providing a wider range of senior leadership and school improvement training, as well as several safeguarding courses. There will be a more comprehensive NQT and RQT programme and we will be introducing a specially tailored well-being programme for headteachers, further details are provided below.

The booking process has been made easier with the introduction of a new on-line booking system. Details of all the courses for 2018-19 has already been sent to schools and a link to the booking site will be e-mailed out to schools and posted on the Diocesan schools' website under CPD and Training before the end of term.

## NQT Programme

A revised and more comprehensive programme for Newly Qualified Teachers has been designed for church schools from next year. The programme will be available as either the full 5-day course, or the option of a shorter 3-day course and will run throughout the academic year. The programme will be delivered by both Diocesan officers and our Headteacher consultants and will take place across a range of our schools in the Diocese.

The programme will include an overview of 'working in a church school,' including visits to 3 church schools to see RE and Worship. Further sessions will include, safeguarding and behaviour, classroom management and working with support staff, an inclusion day, managing workload, a curriculum day including assessment and moderation, the wider curriculum and parental engagement. The programme will culminate in a half-day session on reflection and next steps. Full details and how to book a place will be sent out separately in the next few weeks.

In addition to this, we are inviting all of our NQT's to attend a free welcome lunch and afternoon at Church House on Monday 17<sup>th</sup> September between 12:30pm and 3pm. It is a chance for us to welcome our NQT's to the Diocese and introduce the team and the services and support that is available. It will also be an opportunity to make informal networks with other NQT's across the diocese. It will be necessary to book a place on this event to help us with catering.

## RQT Programme

A newly created course for Recently Qualified Teachers (in their second, third or fourth year of their teaching career) will be offered for next year. The course will be delivered over six half day sessions, one each half term, and will look to build on the NQT year. It will be delivered by Amanda Donelan, Headteacher at Christchurch Moreton, and one of our Headteacher Consultants. Details of the course will be sent out to schools separately.

## Well-being for Headteachers

A further addition to our support to schools next year, is the introduction of a well-being programme for headteachers. This will run as a pilot for next year and if successful, will be expanded in the following year. The aim of the course is to provide the time and space for reflection and to share experiences and mutual support. The course will be delivered by diocesan officers and a team of church school headteachers, who have helped to develop the course, and will be supplemented by occasional invited speakers.

For this first year, it is hoped to run two cohorts of 6-8 headteachers, one aimed at colleagues new to headship or in their first couple of years, and a second group for more experienced heads. The course will include four 'face to face' days during the year and will take place at our retreat centre at Foxhill. In addition to this, on-going support throughout the year will be made available with access to a diocesan officer or one of our Headteacher Consultants. We will also facilitate a peer to peer support network. An invitation to take part in the programme will be sent out shortly.

## Church of England Education Office Publications

We have had several queries from both schools and governing bodies regarding recent publications from the Church of England Education Office and where to find them. Some of these relate to the Church of England, Vision for Education, Valuing All God's Children and Embracing Change: Rural and Small Schools. 
The new facility which replaces the old church hall, is over twice the size of the former building, and will serve as the long-awaited community facility for Handbridge and the wider Chester area.

## News from schools



### **Bickerton Holy Trinity C of E Primary School**

Later on in the term, Antoinette Sandbach, MP visited. Again, she had a tour of the school and talked to the classes about her job and the things she is passionate about. She asked the children what was important to them and encouraged them always to aim to challenge what is not good.



Canon Ian Davenport recently brought some very special visitors to our school too. The Melanesian Brothers from The Solomon Islands talked to the children about their culture and their role within the community. They also taught the children a song about being part of God's family, as, although we are from opposite ends of the earth and from very different cultures, we are all joined together as part of God's family. During

playtime afterwards, Brother Martin joined in with a game of football and the other visitors talked to the children. It was a privilege to welcome them and a very special



opportunity for us. We now hope to set up a link with a school in The Solomon Islands, so the children can find out more.



Following the Royal wedding, the youngest children acted out their own wedding. After lots of preparation (as with any wedding) they came dressed for the occasion and joined together to share in the wedding between the bride and groom. Through the role play the children learnt all about this very special sacrament. Great fun was had by all.

## Bishop Wilson C of E Primary School

On the evening of Friday 18<sup>th</sup> May the school entered their swimming team into the Junior School's Swimming Gala at the EPSV competing against 15 other schools. The team consisted of children from Years 4, 5 and 6. There were heats for each event, and all the students made it through to their finals. When the competition closed and the points were totalled, the Bishop Wilson team were declared the overall winners and were presented with a magnificent shield. Well done everyone who took part.



## Bosley St Mary's C of E Primary School

With the extra focus and hard work for Y6 and Y2 SATs behind them, everyone immediately laid out the trestle tables and hung up the bunting for the sunny Royal Wedding street party, with staff and pupils, parents and friends tucking into cakes the children had decorated and fantastic ice-creams from the visiting van, as well as posing in the royal wedding photo booth.

The Reception and KS1 children had a super trip to Sudbury Hall and the National Trust Museum of Childhood as part of their term's topic about traditional toys and games. The theme continues in several transition events planned for the newcomers to Reception next September, and their parents, such as a picnic afternoon.

Special places and journeys and the concept of pilgrimage has been an interesting focus of RE investigation for the junior class this term. Y5 & Y6 pupils recalled what they had learnt on the Chester Cathedral Pilgrim Days, and local speakers have shared their own pilgrimage experiences on countries like Santiago de Compostela, Lindisfarne, Taize and the war graves of Flanders/France. The journey of life theme flowed into collective worship too, including a Taize-style contemplative, musical prayer time by candlelight. This was just one



of the ways in which they have been trying to offer the children different ways of praying and responding to God, including pop-up prayer spaces created in school by their Vicar, Revd John Harries.

The brilliant iSingPOP musical project run by the Innervation Trust was the perfect focus for the week after SATs and before the holiday. The village church and chapel helped to fund the event, and provided refreshments at the concerts, so that it was truly the community church school project that it is intended to be. It absolutely lived up to expectations, not that everyone knew quite what to expect. It delighted and wowed parents and friends who came to hear the children live in concert. From the youngest to the oldest, they were all amazing, thanks to the enthusiasm and skill of the vocal coach Emma who led the project so professionally. Everyone eagerly awaits the delivery of their own CD of seven specially written iSingPop songs.



## Delamere C of E Academy

Pupils have been getting out and about as their learning journey continues to take them across the country.




## Overleigh St Mary's CE Primary School

Many commented on how lovely the older children were supporting the younger children including those with more competitive natures! ### **St Andrew's Bebington C of E Primary School**

In 2016 St Andrew's had their SIAMS inspection and achieved outstanding. Their target was to extend the children's understanding of the Trinity through collective worship. In school it seemed the children had an excellent understanding of God and Jesus as the Son of God but helping them to understand the power of the Holy Spirit and the effects of the Holy Spirit at work each day in us was difficult to explain. This became their focus.

In a discussion between our headteacher Mrs Viv Woods and Mr Ian Thomson, Ian shared the idea of the Holy Spirit behaving like light entering a prism. The light enters the prism and emerges breaking out into a spectrum of colour. Could the colours be presented to the children as the Fruit of the Spirit.

Our next step was to launch the idea of the light in a prism being compared to the Holy Spirit. Ian Thompson kindly visited for key stage assemblies to introduce the concept of light behaving like God and to illustrate the idea of the light coming from a prism. Building upon the introductory assembly, the children then experienced a Biblical focus day enabling them to explore the Bible story reflecting their class Fruit of the Spirit. Children's thoughts and reflections were recorded in a class reflection book and the Bible stories were very central to these reflections. Children also considered how the stories could give them a message for their lives today. The stories allowed the children a real opportunity to engage with Bible stories they hadn't heard before and develop a depth of understanding which really challenged their thinking.

Mr Chris Gilbert, the Art and Soul Man was invited, to help with designing a new focal point for the school hall. This has encapsulated the idea of the light breaking into a spectrum reflecting the Fruit of the Spirit. All the children in school contributed ideas, drawings and Bible verses for the new focal point and it represents a culmination of all they have learnt about the Fruit of the Spirit and the Holy Spirit at work in them. The Holy Spirit and the Fruit it provides are now a very real part of school. The focal point is fantastic, and the children are reminded each day of the Fruit of the Spirit and can identify with what they learnt in their class.



In years following they will encounter a new colour and a new Fruit of the Spirit. Everyone is very grateful to the Art Students and staff from Woodchurch High School who assisted during the Art Day and also Ian Thomson and Chris Gilbert for their support with the project.



