


## Welcome!

## Week of Prayer for Christian Unity 18-25 January, 2019.

**'Justice and only justice, you shall pursue' (Deuteronomy 16:20)**

**The Churches Together in Cheshire service will be held at 3.00 pm on Sunday, 20<sup>th</sup> January at The Chapel, High Street, Tarporley, and is to be hosted by Churches Together in Tarporley.**

**The preacher will be Fiona Bruce, MP for Congleton and a Lay Canon of Chester Cathedral**

Material for the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity 2019 has been prepared by the Christians of Indonesia. About 10% of Indonesia's 265 million population are Christian – it is a predominately Muslim country, spread across 17,000 islands. The country's fast growing economy has faced many challenges, not least that of corruption, infecting politics and business. In particular, corruption undermines justice and the implementation of the law. As a consequence, the gap between the rich and the poor has widened. Particular religious and ethnic groups have become associated with wealth in ways which promote tensions and pit one community against others.

Indonesian Christians believe that only by heeding Jesus' prayer 'that they all may be one' can they witness to living unity in diversity. They have found the words of Deuteronomy 'justice, and only justice, you shall pursue' speak powerfully to their situation and their needs. They have, therefore, invited Christians and churches across the world to join them in their reflection of this theme.

**Forum 2018**  
**'I am with you always': Together in God's mission**

'Only by working together can we alleviate the pain suffered by so many', said one of the six Presidents of Churches Together in England this week. His Grace Archbishop Angelos, the Orthodox CTE President, was referring to Orthodox, Anglican and Salvation Army churches responding to refugees.

He was speaking alongside his co-Presidents at the Forum of Churches Together in England which took place at Swanwick in Derbyshire on the theme: 'I am with you always – together in God's mission'.

With 270 delegates present, including many under 35yrs, the six Presidents had a conversation together about the 'Presence of Christ'. Questions were posed from six young adults who were present as Forum delegates and each President reflected on the ecumenical journey which we all share in response to the prayer of Jesus for mission and unity.

Pentecostal President, Pastor Agu Irukwu, said that our witness to Christ continues despite what we are going through. 'Whether on the mountains or in the valleys, we tell the story of his presence with us just the same'. Archbishop Justin Welby, the President for the Church of England, added, 'people will see the presence of Christ in us when we stop holding on to things and we start letting God put a cross in our hands'.

Referring to Jesus, one of the young adults asked the Presidents, 'What tables would you overturn?' Cardinal Nichols for the Roman Catholic Church said, 'we are being given a consistent lead by Pope Francis on

clericalism and the assumptions on a position of superiority and privilege that are sometimes present. He wants that table clearly and vigorously turned over’.

Revd Dr Hugh Osgood, the Free Churches President, agreed, suggesting we needed new ways of measuring success, ‘We need to come away from the competitiveness we’ve had between the Churches. Why not measure what impact we are having on society?’



All the Presidents spoke of the need for divine encounter. Revd Canon Billy Kennedy, representing the New Churches, the Religious Society of Friends (Quakers) and the Lutheran and German-speaking Churches, said that in a ‘very fragmented world .. the Church needs to rediscover its confidence,’ and whilst language and culture change, ‘the need in human hearts hasn’t changed.’

Cardinal Nichols used the image of a rose window as a picture of the Church, ‘which always has Jesus at the centre’ he added, referring to the Churches working together in England.

The Forum marked the change of CTE General Secretary from the Revd Dr David

Cornick, who retires, to the Revd Dr Paul Goodliff, recently appointed.

## Movement for Justice and Reconciliation

The Movement for Justice and Reconciliation is a charity whose aims are to examine and highlight the evidence of injustice suffered by people in communities of deprivation where there is a background of colonial or industrial enslavement, and where there is a need for action to effect reconciliation.

MJR is planning to sail a replica slave ship on a public awareness voyage around Britain in June and July 2019. The ship will visit some of the ports that were involved in the Trans-Atlantic slave trade, highlighting not only the history but the on-going legacy of this period in British history.

The aim in each port is to provide an opportunity for visitors to view the on-board exhibition about enslavement and its legacy down the generations. The hope is that the voyage will act as a catalyst for locally resourced projects and events at the time of the ship's visit and afterwards.



It is planned to start the voyage in mid-June in Falmouth, where the ship we are hiring is. It will then visit seven other ports in total: Plymouth, Ilfracombe, Liverpool, Manchester, Whitehaven, Lancaster and Bristol. If you live near any of these places and would like to be involved MJR would be happy to give you more details and put you in touch with the local co-ordinator.

## Unity at the Cross



A developing act of witness to unity has been established, coming from Jonathan Philips, Priest-in-charge at St Peter's at the Cross, Chester, working with Andrew Taylor, Ecumenical Development Officer for Churches Together in Cheshire. The principle is simple: City Centre Church Leaders will gather for a short moment, to pray 'at the cross', both geographically and spiritually.

The hope for this meeting is that it will serve four purposes:

- Increasing unity in the Body of Christ through a simple but powerful act of Church leaders praying together, uniting at the Cross.
- Increasing relational unity across the Church leadership of the City of Chester.

- To be a powerful time of blessing over the city centre and beyond.
- To be a public witness to the world of Jesus' prayer in John 17 and that many will see how we love each other and come to know Him.

Dates have been set for three such Church Leader gatherings in 2109, and in addition it is intended to gather congregations from all the Chester City Centre Churches for a time of shared worship, again gathered 'at the Cross'.
