

Aims and purposes



St Mark's Parochial Church Council (PCC) has the responsibility of cooperating with the Priest in charge, the Revd Alison Cox, in promoting the whole mission of the church, pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical in this part of Dukinfield. The PCC is also specifically responsible for the maintenance of the St Mark's site - the church, hall and grounds.

Objective and Activities

We are committed to enable as many people as possible to worship at St Mark's and to become part of the church family here. The PCC maintains an overview of worship and makes suggestions on how the many services and activities can involve the many groups and individuals operating and living in our parish.

We enable ordinary people to live out their faith as part of our community through:

- worship and prayer
- pastoral care for people living in our parish
- · missionary and outreach work

To facilitate this work, it is important that we maintain the fabric of St Mark's Church and the whole site.



Achievements and Performance

Worship and Prayer

We offer a range of services over the year so that people of all ages can enjoy different styles of worship. For example, we hold occasional Services of the Word, Prayers for Healing with Anointing with Oil and mid-week said communion services. We welcome children to join the choir and gain singing and music instructions for free.

Electoral Roll

Last year a new electoral roll was compiled and the total now is 65. The usual Sunday attendance on Sundays is between 45-50 adults and children.

Occasional Offices

As well as our regular services, we enable our community to celebrate and thank God for milestones of the journey through life - baptism, marriage (and Renewal of Marriage vows) and funerals.






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MAIN EVENTS OF 2017:

- 1. Introduction of a monthly Family Service.
- 2. Confirmation of five adults and five children.
- 3. Experience Easter supported by both Ravensfield and Lyndhurst Primary Schools.
- 4. Alison led the annual Dukinfield Act of Remembrance for the first time.





We hold a variety of services - communion and non communion during the year to respond to the worship needs of a wide variety of people. For instance, we hold the following:

- Mothering Sunday
- · Patronal Festival (followed by lunch)
- Harvest Sunday (followed by lunch)
- · All Saints and All souls service (where names of the departed are read out)

Easter and Christmas services are obviously very important seasons in the Christian calendar for worship. We continue to build on the opportunities to welcome people from the area to connect with Jesus and the church family at this special time. There are several special services and events we conduct at these times - the Maundy Thursday Last Supper; large numbers of people attend our Carol service with Nativity play and we are delighted that not only have both primary schools in our parish used our church building to host Christingle services, but that they have also been in church for more events - Lyndhurst for a Harvest ervice and Ravensfield for a Climate Change project.

And finally, we hugely enjoy welcoming all ages from the local area to join with us in two community outdoor acts of worship - the Whit Walks and Remembrance Sunday. And one indoor ecumenical act of worship - on Women's World Day of Prayer.

Pastoral Care

We have a small group that meets monthly to pray for, and visit, sick or elderly people. Activities that we conduct that support our community include the following:

- Praise & Play our weekly toddler group for carers and their pre-school children
- Annual Christmas Tree Festival this event attracts about 1000 local adults and children
- Courses and social activities we hold courses to develop skills, trips out and social activities that help people connect with one another and overcome isolation and loneliness



We also raise awareness of local, national and international needs supporting the following charities and campaigns: Fairtrade Fortnight; Operation Christmas Child (Samaritan's Purse); Mothers' Union; the Donkey Sanctuary; Christian Aid; Tameside East Foodbank; The Children's Society and Willow Wood Hospice.



Mission and Evangelism

Our parish magazine is produced monthly and is on sale in church. It keeps everybody informed on important matters affecting our church family and information that helps us develop our trust in Jesus and our knowledge of the national church. The church website is available for everybody to be aware of what groups, worship and events take place at St Mark's. A small group gathers each week after the Wednesday communion service for bible study (during term time).





The St Mark's site

We want people to be able to pop into the church for private prayer when ever they need to. The church is open on Sundays. Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays for several hours of the day when people can have access to look around, light a candle or pray. Local people and visitors occasionally ask for the church to be specially opened up for them and we are happy to oblige.


Upkeep of the church building is primarily the responsibility of the church warden. The Priest in Charge and the warden work hard to ensure the building

is kept clean, safe and in good condition dealing with a wide range of specialist contractors. (see Fabric Report by the warden). It is our policy to keep the church in good order and to this end, we keep a Site Works Schedule listing all works needed on the site ensuring that we carefully manage our financial resources and balance the essential work with the desirable (additional radiators in the chancel). The PCC is very grateful to the hours devoted by willing volunteers cleaning the church and undertaking minor repairs.

The church hall is an important resource for the community. It is used by a wide range of groups from toddlers, those with mental health issues, the charity SSAFA and an art group. It is used by local families for children's parties.

Ecumenical Relationships

St Mark's enjoys taking part in the joint services in Dukinfield especially the Whit Walks and the annual Remembrance Sunday service. We also support the annual Women's World Day of Prayer hosted at a different church in the area each year. We held a joint Palm Sunday service with Dukinfield Methodist Church.



Social life

Getting to know one another is vital to our call as followers of Jesus to love one another. Therefore, all opportunities to relax and get to know one another better are vital to the mission of the church. The Sunday Lunch Club continues to operate with the purpose of encouraging folk to join together with others from church over a pub lunch once a month. Anybody is welcome to come along and transport to the pub or restaurant is shared.

Deanery Synod


Two members of the PCC are eligible to sit on deanery synod and the Revd Alison Cox is Rural Dean of Mottram. Deanery Synod provides an important link between this parish and the wider structures of the church.

Financial Review

We are very grateful for the work of John Bowker, church treasurer, in keeping us in good financial health. See his separate report and that of the Independent Examiner, Andrew Shaw.

Reserves policy

It is PCC policy to maintain a balance on unrestricted funds to ensure we have enough to cover emergency work to the church. It is our policy to invest these funds with the CBF Church of England Deposit Fund.



Volunteers

We would like to thank all the volunteers who work so hard to make our church welcoming to adults and children alike. We achieve a lot at St Mark's - in worship, provision of activities and worship for children, social life, events such as the Holiday Clubs, Christmas Tree Festival. This wouldn't be possible without willing teams of people to work behind the scenes and on site in lots of ways.

Structure, governance and management

The method of appointment of PCC members is set out in the Church Representation Rules. All those who attend our services and are members of our congregation are encouraged to register on the Electoral Roll and stand for election to the PCC.

The PCC members are responsible for making decisions on all matters of general concern and importance to the parish including deciding on how the funds of the PCC are to be spent. The full PCC met eight times during the year. The PCC has a number of committees which deal with particular aspects of church life such as the Christmas Tree Festival team and Ministry Team.

We run a parish office on site in the church hall with a computer, photocopier and filing cabinets. This valuable resource enables volunteers to work independently of the priest in charge, keep records secure and work in safety. I'm very grateful for the assistance of Laura Connolly who has taken over producing posters and flyers.

Administrative information

St Mark's Dukinfield is situated off Railway Street, Dukinfield. It is part of the Diocese of Chester within the Church of England. The correspondence address is:



Minutes of Annual Meeting of Parishioners. Sunday, 19 March 2017 @ 12,30 pm

AC read out the names of the sides-people: Barbara Thorpe, Ron Brereton, Anne Speakman, Arthur Bradwell, Brenda Bradwell, Bernice Martin, Val Turner and Maureen Nolan. All were duly elected. Proposed by Chantelle Tunnicliffe and seconded by Kath Maguire.

Appointment of Assistant Wardens

AC explained that, although this was not an elected post, we are hugely grateful for the help and support of the Assistant Wardens. The following were duly appointed: Sandra Austin, Kath Bowker, Ron Brereton, Pauline Clarke and Eileen Newman. AC noted that the Archdeacon's Visitation was at St Thomas' Stockport on 18 May.

Appointment of Independent Examiner

Mr Andrew Shaw was willing to act as Independent Examiner and was duly elected.

Treasurer's Report 2017

Income from general giving remained a concern, however planned giving and CAF donations steadied and increased.

Hall income increased in 2017; however income from "activities to generate funds" reduced.

Kathy Staff annual royalties receipts totalled £29129.64

The Lloyds social account was closed during the year, with the balance transferred to St. Marks parish account; also a closing balance of £614.39 was transferred from the former St. Luke's parish account.

For tax year 2016/7 the HMRC gift aid refund for St. Marks was £4964.38

"Unrestricted" receipts for 2107 totalled £73331.93

Payments totalled £79461.79. Maintaining the church fabric, including the cost of major heating repairs, totalled £11653.22.

The difference of payments over receipts was £6129.86


Deposit accounts cash funds at 31st December 2017 totalled £17828.18

INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT TO THE PCC OF ST. MARK'S DUKINFIELD

This report on the financial statements of the PCC for the year ended 31 December 2017, which are set out on the attached pages, is in respect of an examination carried out in accordance with the Church Accounting Regulations 2006 ("the Regulations") and section 145 of the Charities Act 2011 ("the Act").

Respective responsibilities of the PCC and the examiner

As the members of the PCC you are responsible for the preparation of the financial statements; you consider that the audit requirement of the Regulations and section 144(2) of the Act does not apply. It is my responsibility to issue this report on those financial statements in accordance with the terms of the Regulations and the Act.

Basis of independent examiner's report

My examination was carried out in accordance with the General Directions given by the Charity Commissioners under section 145(5)(b) of the Act and to be found in the Church guidance, 2006 edition. That examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the PCC and a comparison of the financial statements presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the financial statements, and seeking explanations from you as trustees concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit and, consequently, I do not express an audit opinion on the view given by the financial statements.



Warden's Report 2017

Works to the fabric of the church, hall and vicarage in 2017

Church

Annual maintenance:

- 1. PAT testing of electrical equipment
- 2. Hall boiler service and boiler service in church.
- 3. Service of fire extinguishers in hall and church.
- 4. Cleaning of gutters on hall and church (including removing plant life growing in gutters and church tower).
- 5. Annual maintenance of alarm. There were issues with the alarm in December. If the alarm goes off, it is programmed to ring through to dedicated phone numbers. We discovered in December that it was not ringing through. There is a Pay as you Go phone number attached to the alarm and EE (the contractor) had 'suspended' the account because there had not been any calls on the number (i.e., the alarm had not gone off for some time). In order to make sure that the phone line is not suspended again, we now have to ring the number at least once a month just to show activity on the account.

Extraordinary maintenance:

- 6. Removal of leaking heating pipes on one side of the church and replacement with new radiators. In addition, two new radiators were installed in the chancel. I noticed a wet patch in the carpet near to the sound system at the end of October and realised that one of the radiator pipes on the wall was leaking. Our church boiler contractors (Ellesmere Engineering) advised complete removal of the pipes and this work was completed in November. Ellesmere were very prompt and we managed to get the work completed before the Christmas Tree Festival. There is still ongoing work to be done: we need new carpet underlay in this area and also there is some painting work to be done around the wall.
- 7. Installation of new screen monitor on pillar in front of the screen.
- 8. Replacement of leaking lead flashing on the church tower. this was done less than 3 years ago but the contractor used at that time did not do a good enough job.

Contractors:

We have a list of regular contractors that we use: for example, MWhyatt for electrical work, Ellesmere Engineering for the service of the church boiler, Webb Security for the alarm, etc. In addition, we use T Jones a lot – diocesan contractor. It has always been my policy as church warden to make contractors welcome and this is not hard to achieve – cups of tea, biscuits, access to a toilet and taking an interest in what they are doing. Recently Webb security were on site and when leaving the contractor made a point of mentioning how welcome he had felt to Alison. T Jones also recently 'bumped us up the list because we like you' – i.e., they sorted out a problem quickly for us. It is really important that this welcome and hospitality continues. It is in our interests aside from being courteous and modelling the Gospel.

Vicarage

In 2017 there was more work than usual.


- 1. Installation of two working gas fires in Alison's study and in the lounge.
- 2. Replacement of unsafe flooring in the kitchen.
- 3. Cleaning of gutters and maintenance of security lighting.
- 4. Replacement of leaking lead flashing on roof at back of the vicarage.

I have enjoyed being Church Warden but, having been the only Church Warden since 2014, I now wish to stand down. I have learnt a lot, from the habits of pigeons in the tower to the intricacies of church heating pipes. My thanks to all who have helped me in this role. I am grateful to those of you who are willing to take part in the Warden share scheme.


Last Easter and in the summer we ran Holiday Clubs. Children from our community joined us and learned about Jesus, played games, ate, and made crafts.

Mottram Deanery Synod Report - 2017

We had three meetings of Synod in 2017.

Lyn Weston the Diocesan Missioner spoke to the first meeting in February at St. James', Millbrook. Her work across the Diocese is to develop mission:

To proclaim the Good News

To teach, baptise and nurture new believers

To respond to human need by loving service

To seek to transform unjust structures in society

To safeguard the integrity of creation and sustain and renew the life of the earth.

The AGM in June was held at St. Paul's, Stalybridge. Clive Hustwick took on the role of Lay Chair at this meeting.

The final meeting of the year in October was at Holy Trinity, Stalybridge. The Lay Chair and his team prepared a meal for synod members and asked four questions about Deanery Synod.

- * What do you think Deanery Synod is for?
- * What do you want it to be?
- * How could Deanery Synod be a resource for you church's growth and mission?
- * How can your church contribute to this vision (and action) in the extension of God's Kingdom in Mottram Deanery?

The Deanery Church Growth supported St. Michael and All Saints, Mottram with a contribution for a projector for the Magdalene Centre.

As we work together in the deanery we keep the following bible passage in our minds: 'I urge you to live a life worthy of the calling you have received.'

CHILDREN'S CHOIR REPORT FOR APCM 2018

The main events and highlights for the children's choir for this past 12 months have been:

<u>Choir numbers</u> we started the year 2017 with the arrival of Kristie, Kerry and Kamsy swelling our numbers to 11. Towards the end of 2017 we were delighted to welcome Mia, Lilly and Alicia taking us to 14.

Attendance Awards Regular attendance is a requirement of the Voice For Life scheme. This year the trophy was awarded to Ava in both the July and December presentation for 96% and 100% attendance respectively. The choir have very good attendance marks. The average attendance mark is 72%.

<u>Voice for Life medals</u> I thank the church for funding the purchase of the medals during the year for Kristie, Kerry and Kamsy who attained White level by the summer. <u>Progress:</u> Our new members are progressing well through the White a level work. I am hoping that the current White level medalists will achieve Blue Level by the summer.

<u>Women's World Day of Prayer.</u> The children's choir played a major part in this service in March 2017. They participated in the distribution of produce, lead the singing in the unfamiliar hymns and performed two solo items. They enhanced the service by their contributions and we received many compliments from visitors at that service.

Regular performance within services The choir performed at every Family Service, Harvest ,the Christingle service, Family Carol service, Candlemas and the Confirmation Service in September. This helps build on the children's confidence and is an opportunity for them to introduce new material they have learned, plus to lead the congregation in new material such as alternative Lord's Prayers.

My thanks to the Alison and the church for their support and encouragement. Also to Elesha and Susan who helped at choir practices during the year. We have been lucky to have the contribution on guitar from Saeed who has also supported the choir practices and performed solo accompaniments for the choir when possible. Thanks also to him for his assistance.


I would like to thank our loyal band of leaders and helpers for their continued support. As we continue to grow and move over to the Church Hall, more volunteers needed.
