Section One - Background

Introduction

Consecrated in 1863, All Saints is the original parish church of Cheadle Hulme, a suburban area 10 miles south of Manchester and 3 miles south-west of the centre of Stockport. It is now one of three Anglican churches in Cheadle Hulme, the others being St Andrews and Emmanuel. The church is situated on Church Road in Cheadle Hulme.

The Parish of All Saints is situated in the southern half of Cheadle Hulme, a mainly residential suburb in the Borough of Stockport, Greater Manchester, and has a population of approximately 13,500.

It is in the Province of York, Diocese of Chester, Archdeaconry of Macclesfield and Deanery of Cheadle.

The PCC has the responsibility for the maintenance and upkeep of the Church building, other Church property and assets, management and reporting of the Church's finances and its outward giving.

It also has the responsibility for co-operating with the incumbent, in promoting within the ecclesiastical parish the whole mission of the Church – pastoral, evangelical, social and ecumenical.

Vicar's Report

Dear friends,

I am pleased to introduce our Annual Report for 2018.

Our aims this last year as a PCC were to look at developing Messy Church and, if you look at the Messy Church report you will see that good progress has been made. We also set, as one of our aims, the transfer of the Parish Rooms to PCC control. This is ongoing and has not progressed as quickly as we would have liked. Finally, we wanted to look into bereavement support and support of our elderly members. Clare Russell and Linda Ackerley have only a few months to go before they are licensed as pastoral workers and, while Clare has been developing Mainly Music and Messy Church, Linda has been developing our bereavement work and also set up a "Seniors' Tea Party".

Despite having goals the PCC have always been aware that we should not ignore other opportunities that arise and, with Sarah taking over the website and setting up a Facebook account, we have made great strides in letting the wider community know what we are about and what we are doing.

Apart from our usual celebration services this last year we have also held a service to mark the 100th anniversary of the end of World War One. This anniversary has struck a chord in our community and throughout the country and we were pleased that so many attended the service. We are also in negotiation with the War Graves Commission so that we can have a sign outside church to mark that our churchyard contains some war graves.

Last year we had 3 weddings, 17 baptisms and, with the help of Rev David Parker, 16 funerals in church. David has now left to live in Ely and we are all most grateful for his help and support. We have seen new people join us for our regular Sunday worship and our organist Trevlyn has given valuable help and advice to the leadership team as well as training our choir. A full report on the activities of the choir is in this Annual Report.

As always Pat and Michael have been my rocks – always willing to help and working so hard. Sadly, Michael, having been made Emeritus, has not been able to take part recently due to illness but it is my hope and prayer that, when this is published, he will be much better.

Home groups have met during Lent and Advent at the Vicarage as well as the Bible study group held at Constance and David Jones' house. Those attending have found the fellowship, support and discussion helpful. We have continued with our special bereavement and Advent service as well as prayer meetings and healing services.

Our Churchwardens Janet and John have worked very hard last year. The PCC has given wise and supportive counsel, as we consolidated projects started and discussed what we need to do in the future. Our treasurer Jeremy has helped the PCC immensely with his care and explanation of our accounts. Although, on paper, we may look to be a church in a stable financial position the fact that our income does not meet our outgoings leaves us in a vulnerable position. The number of occasional offices (a source of income) varies from year to year and is not in our control. Legacies to the church are rare nowadays.

We have put in place activities which, hopefully, will encourage a new generation of church goers. There is no single "fix" for this issue. We all have to do what we can in a variety of

ways – in our faithful generous giving, in inviting friends to church, in our care for our community and, perhaps, remembering the church in our will.

We have a lot to be grateful for in the support and fellowship we receive here at All Saints – not just on Sundays but also through the various groups that meet here and the events organised by the hard working Charities Committee.

It has been a difficult year for many in our congregation. Some have been unable to attend church because of long term illness. Others have lost loved ones and as a church we have lost several well known members of our congregation who will be missed. Even now some of our congregation are facing treatment for serious conditions. Our love and prayers are with them.

On the happy side, we have been joined by new people attending our services and existing congregation members volunteering for new roles and taking on more responsibilities in the church. We have also welcomed Rev Janet Owens and her husband Roger to All Saints where Janet has been able to help out with services and get to know the congregation.

Once again, it has been a privilege to serve the church as your Vicar. There are so many people to thank and I hope to remember all those people in my report to the APCM as well as setting out the churches vision and priorities for 2019/20.

Thank you for taking time to read the All Saints Annual Report, thank you to all those who have helped in its production and thank you to all those who have worked so hard to look after the church and forward its mission last year.

All Saints Mission Statement

All Saints Church Cheadle Hulme seeks to be a church which:

Our Mission - Reaching Up

Reaches up – glorifying God in our worship and providing a welcoming and sacred space where everyone can be helped to worship God in the beauty of holiness.

A range of groups and activities help us to achieve our Mission in this regard, in particular in supporting our worship at a range of church services, in enhancing services through the provision of music and floral displays in church, and in assisting our young people in their worship at service times.

Worship services

Our pattern of worship for this year has been as follows: -

Sunday 8.00 am Holy Communion (BCP)

10.00 am Parish Communion (Common Worship) with an All Age Communion

service on the second Sunday of the month.

6.30 pm Evensong (BCP) with Choral Evensong on 2nd Sunday of the month.

Tuesday 9.30 am Holy Communion (Common Worship)

Thursday 10.00 am Holy Communion (Common Worship)

Sermons are preached on Sundays at 10 am and 6.30 pm and on the Thursday 10 am service.

Changes are made to the above pattern to include a special Advent service; Ash Wednesday service (with imposition of ashes); Maundy Thursday (with foot washing); Good Friday three-hour devotional service; and Ascension Day (Celtic style Communion). Our All Age services have celebrated Mothering Sunday and Harvest and have also included a Remembrance service, Toy service and Christingle.

To commemorate the 100th anniversary of the Armistice, we held a special service using elements of the original commemoration service held at All Saints in 1918.

At Christmas time we have welcomed the Women's Institute and schools to the church for their Carol services and have also held a Candlelit Carol service and Crib service.

Our service books reflect the changing seasons of the church year and are available in large print version. For our All Age service we also use the screen and project the words.

The uniform groups have helped with the All Age services and we have used a varied liturgy in these services.

The Choir

The choir continues to go from strength to strength. Our newer members are gaining in confidence and surprising themselves by their ability. Long-standing members have also enhanced their skills and this has resulted in singing of a standard which has called forth appreciative comments from members of the congregation, as well as from the organist!

The competence of the choir was demonstrated clearly at Christmas when, having been 'struck down' by labrinthitis, I had to cancel the final choir rehearsal for the Christmas Services and was unable to play for any of them. However thanks to the generosity of Eric Ward (to whom we are greatly indebted for playing for the three major Christmas services), the choir showed their confidence and competence in being able to sing their pieces without a final rehearsal, and with a different organist at both the Carol Service and Midnight Communion. Well done!

Building on this we are preparing a Choral Evensong with a complete set of responses and choral settlings of the Magnificat and Nunc Dimitis. We have a regular chanted setting of Choral Evensong (at 6.30pm) on the second Sunday in the month: if you have never attended such a service why not come along – just to see (and hear) what it is like?

As always we welcome new members, so if you can 'hold a tune' and are willing to learn (no experience necessary) why not come along for a couple of sessions just to try it out, or speak to any member of the choir to find out first hand what we are all about – there is no obligation to join. We rehearse on a Wednesday at 3.30pm when the clocks go back, and at 7pm when the clocks go forward.

Our Mission - Reaching Out

Reaches out – being part of our community, serving our community and sharing the good news of God's love in Jesus Christ by word and action.

Our outreach covers charitable giving and support for those in need. The Charities Committee, a committee of the PCC, undertakes activities to generate funds for outward giving throughout the year, often with a secondary remit of providing social activities for church members. The church organises additional support, both financially and through prayer.

We are keen to help young people and families in their understanding of our faith. We support our young people's uniformed groups, and the "Mainly Music" group for pre-school children and their carers, established in 2015 to fill a significant gap in our Mission, has continued to thrive and grow.

Our membership of co-ordinating bodies for faith related groups in the area assists in our understanding of and support for similar groups in the Parish, while our Parish Magazine and newly relaunched website help to spread our message.

Charities Committee

The Charities Committee is responsible for overseeing a funding programme that year on year raises money in aid of charities, both in the UK and abroad.

Events throughout 2018 included a coffee morning, beetle drive, hotpot lunch and the all traditional Christmas Fair. These few events combined delivered a healthy net income of £2,350, and so in view of that positive result it was decided that an additional £250 donation be made to The Brain Tumour Charity in recognition of a fund recently set up in memory of Luke Fallon and known as The Luke Fallon Fund. The bulk of the income was split equally between:

COFFEE 4 CRAIG – Given the recent rise in homelessness, it seemed only right to support a charity that 365 days a year distributes food and clothing to the homeless living rough on the very streets of Manchester.

NATIONAL AUTISTIC SOCIETY (MANCHESTER BRANCH) – By focusing again on Manchester is a further example of the Committee's readiness to champion causes that specifically benefit communities in and around the region.

WATER AID – Water Aid remains committed to helping raise hygiene standards in areas of the world where poverty and deprivation are endemic and where disease from contaminated water is on the increase. The charity does concede, however, that its pledge to make clean drinking water accessible to all is still years away from becoming reality.

The Committee would again like to express its thanks to everyone who supported last year's events, thus helping to achieve this positive outcome.

Christian Aid

The Lent Lunch in February raised £247.50.

In May the house to house collection raised £1,195. On the sponsored walk John and Elizabeth Hughes collected £415 and Beryl Parker raised £135. This gives a total of £1,745 for Christian Aid Week.

In September a collection in church for the Kerala Floods Appeal raised £286.50.

The street collection in October raised £121 and the sponsored swim in November amounted to £408.

This gives a total for 2018 of £2,808. Additionally, much of the money was gift aided which brings in an extra 25p for every £1 donated.

Members of All Saints' also took part, with other churches in Cheadle Hulme, in two collections at Handforth Dean where over £1,665 was collected.

In 2018 the Cheadle Hulme Churches Together sub-committee for Christian Aid gave £5,000 to a Christian Aid project for displaced people in Lebanon and Iraq which received matched funding at the rate of £6 for every £1 raised. We have also given a further £5,000 for a Christian Aid project for young people with HIV and Aids in Kenya. This project is matched funded at the rate of £17 for every £1! We hope to be able to support further projects in 2019.

Many thanks to all those who have contributed in any way to Christian Aid in 2018.

These fundraising events and the money raised did not form part of the PCC's accounts.

Messy Church

Cheadle Deanery Synod

The purpose of the Synod is to provide a link between local churches and the Diocese. Cheadle Deanery Synod met three times during 2018.

The first meeting of the year, in March, was held at St Cuthbert's, Cheadle. The meeting included a talk by Emily Allen, the Church Buildings Development Officer, about a new initiative to enable churches in the Chester diocese to share details of contractors and also their experiences of maintenance work in their buildings.

The meeting in June was at Emmanuel, Cheadle Hulme. Kath Leigh gave a presentation of "Transforming Lives Together". This is a joint initiative for community development between Chester Diocese and the Church Urban Fund.

The final synod of the year was in October, at St Michael's, Bramhall. There was a discussion on how the different churches in the Deanery made the most of festivals (eg Halloween, Remembrance Sunday, Christmas and Easter) to connect with people in the community.

All the meetings began with Worship and included financial and Synod reports and also any notices from the Rural Dean and the parishes.

Website and Social Media

The website https://www.allsaintscheadlehulme.org.uk/ was relaunched just over 12 months ago and has continued to be a useful tool to engage with the church community and beyond. The site has the church calendar, information about our groups and allows users to listen to recent sermons preached in Church. This Autumn we launched a news and events section to showcase all our activities. Although the figures are small, the website audience is growing.

We also updated our presence on the national Church of England site A Church Near You (https://www.achurchnearyou.com/church/12892/). This gives the church curious searcher information about us and our services and directs them to our own website.

In September 2018 we set up a Facebook page https://www.facebook.com/AllSaintsCH/ Our own follower numbers are small but growing steadily. However, sharing our posts in local groups gives us the potential to reach thousands of people e.g. our Christmas Day service post had a reach of more than 2,900. We believe this will be particularly helpful in connecting with younger people who rely on social media for information. At the Christingle service we did our first live 'broadcast' from All Saints' via Facebook. This allowed us to share the lighting of the candles beyond that day's congregation.

Our Mission - Reaching In

Reaches in – providing a caring, inclusive and nurturing environment where we can help each other on our spiritual journey.

Church members run a range of groups providing faith related social activities for all our members. These include social and Bible study groups, enabling our members to support each other and to develop their faith.

Afternoon Bible Study Group

This group has continued to meet at the home of David and Constance Jones.

Friday Club

Friday Club is a ladies group that was started at All Saints over 50 years ago. We still have one founder member, Ann Hewitt, who was present at the early meetings. Section Five - The Parochial Church Council

Charitable Objectives and Principal Activities

The primary objective of the PCC is the promotion of the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to the doctrines and practices of the Church of England. The main activities of the church include regular public worship open to all, pastoral work, teaching of Christianity through sermons and small groups, the provision of activities for all groups including parents, toddlers and young people, and support for charities in the U.K. and overseas.

The PCC has been committed to making worship at All Saints accessible to as many people as possible, and to encouraging them to become part of our Parish community. The PCC has maintained an overview of worship as expressed in all the activities of the Church, making suggestions as to how our services could involve the many groups within the Parish.

In planning the activities for the year the incumbent and the PCC have considered the Charity Commission's direction on Public Benefit, giving special attention to the guidance to charities engaged in the advancement of religion. In particular we have sought to equip people to live out their faith as part of the Parish community through:

- worship and prayer
- learning about the Gospel and developing their true knowledge and trust in Jesus
- provision of pastoral care for people living in the Parish and
- missionary and outreach work.

We have set out our approach to developing faith in the Parish in our All Saints Mission Statement.

Review of the PCC during 2018

The PCC met on 6 occasions during 2018 with an average attendance of 13 members out of 17 members at each meeting (18 members as of November 2018). The PCC has dealt with:

- 1. The election of PCC Officers.
- 2. The reception of reports from Deanery Synod, Charities and other church committees and also various correspondence.
- 3. The Wardens have undertaken the care and management of the church, its fabric and its utilities.
- 4. The Wardens have kept members informed at each meeting about all of the church's various activities.
- 5. The Treasurer has continued to produce carefully prepared computerised reports of our income and expenditure and has given explanations at each PCC meeting.
- 6. General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) advised actions have been completed for All Saints by Julia Ball, Clare Russell and Trevlyn Thomas.
- 7. The website has been completely renewed during the year by a team led by Clare Russell and Sarah Ball
- 8. The Facebook page has been set up and populated by Sarah Ball
- 9. All Saints welcomed retired priest Revd Janet Owens to the clergy in October 2018, who agreed to preside and preach at some of our services.

Governing Document

Membership and Terms of Office 2018

The PCC is an independent charity, registered with the Charity Commission as charity number 1131779. It is part of the Diocese of Chester within the Church of England.

Section Six - Finance and Governance

Financial Review

Total income on the unrestricted (general) fund amounted to £87,836 compared with the 2017 figure of £88,428. In 2018 Giving including related Gift Aid brought in £65,250 compared with £66,837 in 2017. The year 2018 includes £11,940, a full year's income for the rental of the Curacy currently occupied by a tenant. The PCC again received a lower amount of fees for weddings and funerals of £3,560 compared with £4,098 in 2017 and £6,661 in 2016

Unrestricted expenditure was £122,358, a minor decrease of increase of £551 from the 2017 figure of £122,909. The largest item of expenditure was the Parish Share, at £82,756, 67% of unrestricted expenditure, compared with the 2017 figure of £80,738 (66% in 2017), an increase of £2,018. The Parish Share is paid to the Diocese to cover essential costs incurred across the Diocese as a whole, a major element being clergy costs.

The net movement in the unrestricted fund was a reduction of £34,693 (2017 - £33,577).

Restricted funds consisted of a Music Fund (£290 all expended during the year), and the Charities Committee Fund (income of £3,247 with costs of £931 and donations of £2,350 resulting in an reduction of £34 to the end of year balance of £133). In addition, £12 is received from the Commonwealth War Graves Commission each year, and is expended on grave maintenance.

The net movement in the restricted funds was £324 (2016 - £67).

A loss on investments of £171 was sustained in the year (2017 – gain of £904).

Total net movements across all funds therefore amounted to a reduction of £35,017 (2017 - £33,510).

Total assets at 31 December 2018 stood at £1,109,173, of which the unrestricted fund is £1,109,040.

Of this, Fixed Assets account for £847,287, a reduction of £5,264 (£5,093 due to depreciation and £171 due to changes in investment value). Of the total figure, £814,978 represents the Church rebuilding costs. The Fixed Asset value is not available as usable funds for the Church.

The Net Current Assets for all funds, mostly cash at bank and invested, amounted to £261,886 at the year end, compared with £291,639 at 31 December 2017 £322,766 at 31 December 2016, and £361,457 at 31 December 2015.

The reduction in total net assets in 2018 amounted to £35,017 (2017 - £33,510).

Reserves

Note 19 to the Accounts shows the assets and liabilities attributable to the various funds by type, and Note 18 summarises the movement on each restricted fund in the period.

The PCC recognises the need for the Charity to establish and maintain reserves to enable it to continue to carry out its charitable objectives in the event of unforeseeable matters arising.

It is the policy of the Church that unrestricted funds which have not been designated for a specific use should be maintained at a level equivalent to between three and six months' expenditure.

The Trustees consider that reserves at this level ensure that, in the event of a significant drop in funding, they will be able to continue the Church's current activities while consideration is given to ways in which additional funds may be raised. This level of reserves has been maintained throughout the year. The Trustees are aware of the continuing year on year reduction in funds and are considering ways in which the level of annual loss can be addressed.

Risk Management

The Trustees have assessed the major risks to which the Charity is exposed and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks.

Policies and procedures are in place covering relevant requirements such as Health and Safety, employment law, Charities Act, and child protection. The buildings are in good repair and maintained on a regular basis.

Statement of Members' Responsibilities

The members of the PCC are responsible for preparing an Annual Report and Financial Statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice), and the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) applicable to Charities and relevant requirements of the Financial Reporting Standard (FRS 102).

The members of the PCC are required to prepare financial statements for each year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Church and of the incoming resources and application of resources of the Church for that period. In preparing those financial statements, the PCC members have complied with the requirements to:

- Select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently
- Observe the methods and principles of the Charities SORP
- Make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent
- State whether applicable standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements
- Prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the Church will continue in business.

The members of the PCC are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the Church and which enable them both to ascertain the financial position of the Church and ensure that the accounts comply with the Charities Act 2011, the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) applicable to Charities and relevant requirements of the Financial Reporting Standard (FRS 102), and the provisions of the trust deed.

They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Church and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities. In particular they are responsible for investing charitable funds wisely to maximise the return in a manner conducive to its charitable needs and demands.

The members of the PCC acknowledge their responsibilities in relation to these requirements as set out above.
