Autumn Joy



LET'S BEGIN...

Start by making a den! This should be everyone together gathering blankets, blankets and duvet covers from around the house. Make it the best den ever, and make sure all of you can fit inside it!

Finally add a string of fairy lights to light up the space. You may want to get a snack or drink to celebrate your den!

Now, whilst sitting in the den read the Bible passage from Isaiah 9. Explain that this part of the Bible was written 1000 years before Jesus was born, so for all those years people were hopeful that God's special baby would come.

You may want to take it in turns to read it, and one person can switch the lights on and off whenever the reader mentions 'darkness' and 'light'.

ACTIVITIES

In the resource pack on the back pages are giant letters that spell out HOPE. Print them out, then colour them in bright colours. Cut them out and punch holes in the bottom of each letter.

Then cut out the tags and give each person one or two. They can write something on them that they feel hopeful for. Encourage everyone to think about what God would want us to be hopeful for, not simply materialistic things! Talk together and discuss what it means to have our hope in Jesus.

Then use string to dangle the tags from the HOPE letters. You can stick the letters onto the wall or on your fridge and add as many tags as you want over the coming days and weeks.

PRAYER

Dear Jesus, help our family walk in Your light as we show other people what it means to have hope in You. Amen.

THIS WEEK...

Bibles
In the resource pack there are Bible character puppets to colour, cut out and attach to lolly sticks. Your child can play with them through the coming weeks.

School Day
Make an advent calendar using the instructions in the resource pack. This is a great rainy day activity and you can fill up each pouch with goodies or messages of hope for the coming month.

Creatings
Put on some Christmas carols in the car or kitchen and worship as you go about your daily life!




RE Quality Mark




DfE Guidance on Governance

The DfE have published two helpful documents regarding the structures of governance in academies and maintained schools and also roles and responsibilities within them. Free support for Governing Boards



Thinking Governance is a free programme developed by the Church of England Education Office that supports governors in developing a vision and strategic plan. The full programme has been shared previously with schools but an additional programme has been developed called Thinking Governance Express.

The normal programme takes around 8 hours over a number of sessions. With the impact of the current situation it has been realised that governors may need to review the plan that was in place and adjust it to reflect the impact of lockdown and the return.

To support this Thinking Governance Express is a shorter programme with two modules that helps governors review their plan/vision and look at what to do going forward. It's a really good programme that can be undertaken remotely or in person and has some instructional videos which explains how to use the resource.





RE Resources from NATRE



NATRE (National Association of Teachers of Religious Education) in partnership with the Free Churches Group, Methodist Schools, RE Today, NATRE and many teachers of RE and educators from Black, Asian and other minority ethnic communities have recently jointly published some Anti-racist RE resources. The resources include films and classroom ideas for Upper KS2 & KS3.

NATRE says: *'In RE pupils learn about diversity all the time. In anti-racist RE, negative or racist attitudes or behaviour are confronted and challenged so that prejudice can be reduced and equality and justice issues can be highlighted.'*

NATRE have also published a 'Bullying and Belief Toolkit' which is a resource to support schools to deal with the topic of religious bullying. 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


Admissions

This is a reminder that VA schools and academies must consult on their admission arrangements every seven years even if there are no changes. For a number of schools this will be the year that they need to consult (the work on the variation does not count as a consultation). Please check our guidance which can be found [here](#) and also a reminder that the policy should come to the DBE prior to any consultation. Sue Noakes will be able to check it to make sure it follows the current legislation. The variation wording that we included in 2021 policies should also be included in the 2022 policy as the variation is a permanent change to the policy.

We are starting to get variation judgements coming through. Once you have received your judgement you can then publish the policy with the variation included.

News from Schools

Bollington St John's C of E Primary School

Bollington St John's have been awarded the British Council's prestigious International School Award in recognition of its work to bring the world into the classroom. The International School Award celebrates the achievements of schools that do exceptional work in international education. The school's international work includes a whole school and community plastic pledge, where children, parents and governors signed an agreement to reduce the use of plastics. This initiative was started by the school's student council and global ambassador pupils. They also spoke to former Bollington Mayor, Roland Edwards, and local town councillors about the work they had done towards the United Nation's Sustainable Development Goals.

Bridgemere C of E Primary School

Class 4 have been exploring 'Good News' in their RE lessons and how the 'I am sayings' of Jesus are still signs of good news for Christians today. They have enjoyed using their creative skills to share what these sayings means to them.



Overleigh St Mary's C of E Primary School



Y6 in RE have been looking at how to help others. They have been focussing on Christian Aid, and how it helps people all around the world. One of the activities has been to look at all the different countries where Christian Aid is active and put these onto the class world map. The information included the work Christian Aid does, the children it helps and the different religions and languages of those people. The map is up and ready for people to see.

Elworth C of E Primary School Harvest Prayer Space

Pupils had a wonderful day and amazed teachers with their thoughtful reflections and prayers. The prayer spaces were themed around this term's worship on generosity. There was also a prayer space dedicated to Operation Christmas Child. As a school there is a set target of 24 boxes - 2 from each class. The generosity of the school family was overwhelming, and they ended up filling 60 boxes. There was also a prayer space for the local food bank, again the generosity shown was incredible. A clear answer to prayer.



Teachers were so proud of the children and how they conducted themselves. The feeling in the hall was so calm and the chat between the children was inspiring. New Chaplain, Cathryn Houghton, who is St Peters Children and Families worker, also joined. She has been part of the school family for a couple of years and in September she took on a more formal role as chaplain. We are very blessed to have Cathryn. The next Prayer Space will be at the end of the Spring term and be themed around Easter.

Great Budworth C of E Primary School



Great Budworth have opened a new chapter in its history by creating a new purpose-built library. The construction of the library represents the latest in a series of innovative and imaginative building projects that have taken place since the school opened in 1857. With the original vaulted ceiling providing the perfect space to construct a mezzanine floor, it is now home to the stunning new library. Its creation was driven by the determination and passion for the school of the former Chair of Governors, Mrs Hilary Brudenell. Sadly, Mrs Brudenell passed away as the builders were nearing completion and she didn't get to see the project finished, but the school will honour her by naming the library after her as soon as the postponed official opening ceremony is able to take place.

Sandra Finney, Head Teacher is thrilled with the new library, "So much hard work has gone into this project and to see it come to fruition, and the brilliant resource we now have, really does make all the effort worthwhile.

"We have had incredible support from the Chester Diocese, our PTA who have raised funds to furnish the library and the many people who have generously donated books." "At a time when many schools are having to close their libraries, we are so proud to be able to open our new one.

Kingsley St John's CE Primary School

Steve Baker, foundation governor at Kingsley has been awarded an OBE in the Queen's Birthday Honours list for services to education.

Steve is the executive headteacher of the outstanding Aspire Schools Federation including Gilbrook and Kilgarth schools based on the Wirral. He is highly regarded in the world of education, leading schools on non-confrontational behaviour management and has held a range of school leadership positions, including Ofsted Inspector, and is often selected as a keynote speaker at educational conferences.



Steve is a member of the Ambition Institute and Learnus advisory boards (Learnus is a think tank that aims to bridge the gap between neuroscience research and education); he was recently made a Founding Fellow of the Chartered College of Teaching for his 'significant and sustained' impact on teaching. Steve is on the SecEd and Headteacher Update editorial board, sits on the panel of judges for the Pearson Teaching Awards and works with the Ministry of Justice in youth and adult establishments nationwide as they focus their efforts on developing a culture of rehabilitation.

As a former war crimes investigator, Steve regularly speaks in schools and prisons about the consequences of hatred; in addition to receiving the Queen's Award for Voluntary Service, an award by Lord Bourne for his 'outstanding contributions to tackling hatred and building a better society,' he has now been awarded an OBE in the 2020 Queen's Birthday Honours List.

Lower Peover C of E Primary School

Forest schools allow children to have the time and space to develop and gain new skills and interests, and to further their knowledge about the environment and learn to love the world whilst nurturing nature. This evolves through a range of activities that are provided for them, with the attributes to be able to grow as an individual but continuing to learn how to work as a team. Forest School at Lower Peover helps children to become healthy, resilient, creative and independent learners within the beauty of the natural woodland.



Marton & District C of E Primary School

The staff and new PE Provider (ASM Sports) wanted to welcome the children back in an energetic style. Given that some of the children had not been in school since March they thought about the best way to do this. The plan was to rebuild some of the friendships, develop some teamwork and welcome the children back with a bang. The idea was to launch the new school year with ASM's very own assault course challenge. The challenge included nets to climb under, balance beams and tyre traps to list just a few of the obstacles. The children had a fantastic time and were all thoroughly exhausted by the end of their session on the assault course. A huge thank you went out for all the hard work the ASM staff put into the event.

Everyone at Marton & District CE Primary continued to show their support in the community this Harvest time. Now more than ever, they saw the importance of supporting others and were delighted to raise awareness for The Store House Food Bank. Loading their Harvest donations into the brand new 'Love Thy Neighbour' Van, the whole school was delighted to maintain their assistance for a special place that helps so many local families, even without the traditional harvest display and festival in the hall for Marton families (due to restrictions). The school enjoyed sharing their online harvest videos with parents and each other's classes, to once again celebrate this special time of compassion, and in thanking God for the harvest.

Shocklach Oviatt C of E Primary School

On 13th October, a really special outdoor Harvest Service was held with a re-enactment of the text, 'Handa's Surprise' and some reflections on the theme of thankfulness. Chris Gilbert joined the service to lead with his Guitar Group with a brilliant rendition of 'Times like These'. It was lovely to hear the children talk about counting our blessings and being thankful for the things that really matter: families, health, friendships, teachers, our beautiful world, pets and, of course, for the food we have to eat. Their final reflection was particularly moving: "We are also very thankful that Shocklach School has re-opened and that we can play, have fun, learn and worship together". Special thanks must go to Reverend Tim, Reverend Norma, Chris Gilbert and St Edith's Church Warden and School Governor, Helen Peel for all their support, kindness and flexibility. A group of Shocklach pupils also sang and played musical instruments at St Edith's Harvest Service. On entering the church, four year old Ben exclaimed, "isn't it great to be back here again" – out of the mouth of babes.



Sir Thomas Boteler C of E High School



This year, students were given the opportunity to enter the Cannon Chancellors Award at Chester Cathedral, the focus being Pilgrimages or special journeys. Year 7 students, who are now in Year 8, were doing a project based on communities and belonging. Following on from this, they studied pilgrimage and Labyrinths. Inspired by the significance and symbolism in Labyrinth designs, the students requested to research them further, with the goal of creating one in school. They recognised the value of having a space for reflection and contemplation within the busy school day.

The group put a proposal together for their Headteacher, Mrs Beverley Scott-Herron, and presented their ideas. They also worked with the school's Graphic Designer, Miss Alice Roberts, to come up with some suitable designs for their Labyrinth, they surveyed the school building for suitable sites. It was agreed the Labyrinth would be built within the school's Peace Garden. The students are looking forward to work beginning on the creation of the Labyrinth and reflection space.

To their delight, the group won the Cannon Chancellors Award for their Labyrinth project. This involves a prestigious opportunity to visit Chester Cathedral, which they plan to do as soon as they are able. Head of RS, Mrs Kate Coleclough, said “It’s fantastic for our work to be recognised within the Diocese. We are so proud to be able to create something for all students and staff to use in school, both now and in the future, that will benefit them and help them take time out in a busy day to reflect and refresh.”

Tilston Parochial C of E Primary School
