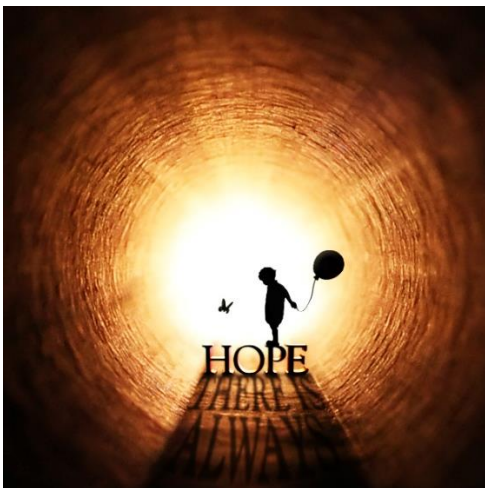

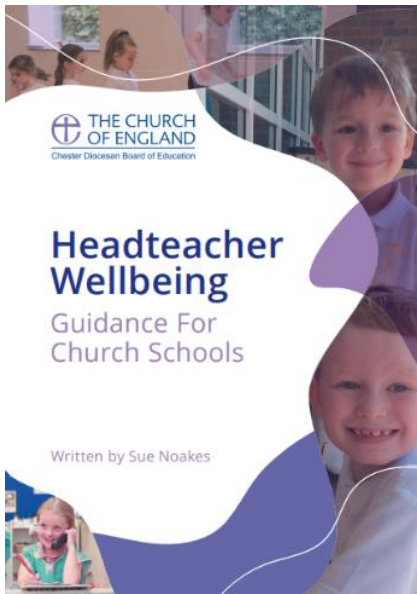
Training & Courses

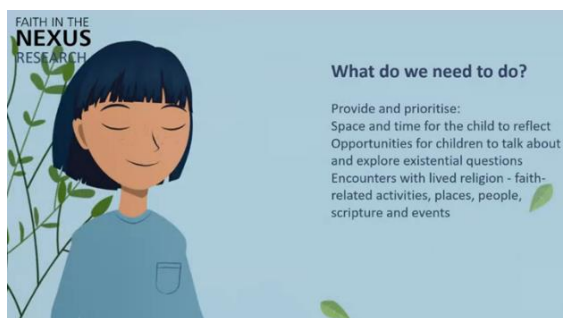
All schools are eligible to apply. Closing date for entries is 31 March 2021.

Faith in the Nexus

The end of 2020 saw the launch of a crucial piece of research that very much feeds into the [Growing Faith Adventure](#) in the Church of England. Led by the National Institute for Christian Education Research (NICER) the key findings outline how spiritual flourishing for children and young people takes place in the nexus of school, homes and church. Click the image to the right to read the full report.

It is encouraging to see that much of what we do already as church schools has a significant impact on children and young people being able to explore the big questions of life. It is good to celebrate the relationships between church, school and home whilst considering how we can develop them further as we strive to create a community in which children and young people are encouraged to develop spiritually as well as academically – Ofsted



themselves cited such opportunities as one of their key factors in progressing schools in their 2019-20 report. Click on the image to the left to find a short animation outlining the key findings and challenges to move forward in this area.

At the start of the new year, it is a good time to consider how we can effectively work together, each aspect of the nexus, helping children to think deeper and remain spiritually

curious as they grow, and how we, as church schools can help households to continue the conversation. Reflective spaces in school were a key positive feature in the findings. Global Resources for Schools

[Lyfta](#) is a versatile resource which our schools may wish to use to give pupils an opportunity to explore real life human stories from around the world. It is a learning platform which allows children to foster critical thinking and discuss their own (and the school's) values in relation to a changing world. It can broaden their world view by giving them a chance to be 'immersed' in different people's lives and communities, in an engaging manner, encouraging them to see beyond their lived realities.

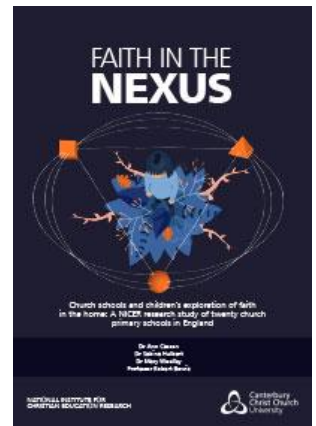


It is a really exciting resource to engage with, focused on genuine experiences for global awareness, giving the opportunity to enhance many key areas of the National Curriculum as well as work in several strands of the SIAMS framework within school (such as courageous advocacy). In addition, state-funded schools can receive a free CPD session and a term's free subscription to explore the platform for themselves.

Holocaust Memorial Day

Holocaust Memorial Day takes place on 27th January 2021. The theme for Holocaust Memorial Day this year is *Be the Light in the Darkness*. The Holocaust Education Trust are also offering free **online teacher training sessions** which model how this theme can be discussed in the classroom. Their 'Introduction to the Holocaust Educational Trust' seminar takes place twice a month and will next run on:

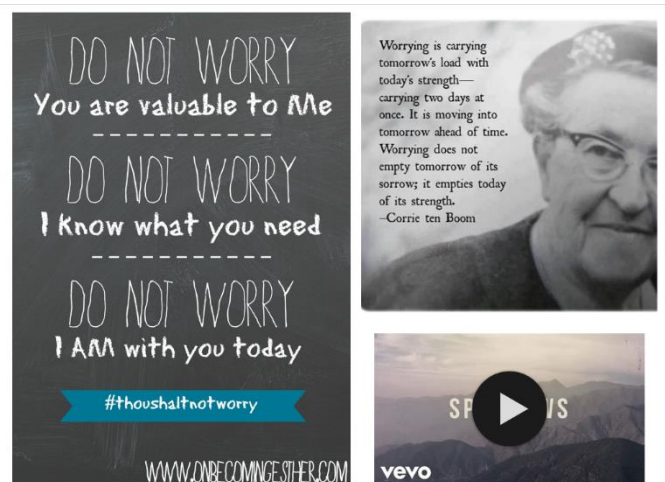

Admissions

Admissions Code amendments: Work has begun on amending the required Statutory Instrument regarding changes to admissions and it is intended to lay this before Parliament in February. (The main reason for that is because Parliamentary time will probably not be available in January, given the requirements of Brexit and other legislation). The required amendments to the Code itself will carry on in parallel. This means we can expect to see a new admissions code soon after this.

Once the instrument and Code are passed with these amendments, they can be included in school admissions arrangements at whatever date they come into force. One of these will be the inclusion of children in care from overseas. Such additions do not require consultation or notification, as they will come under the provision that schools must comply with the Code and must therefore amend their arrangements accordingly.


We will update you as soon as we receive any further information.

This is a reminder to schools that the variation agreed by the schools' adjudicator regarding attendance at worship remains in your policy for subsequent years. If you wish to remove the variation you would need to consult using the normal consultation process. As it is not clear whether or not there may be further closure of churches we would recommend that you keep the variation in your arrangements when you determine your policy for 2022 (which needs to be done by 28th February this year).

National Younger Leadership Groups 2020

Autumn saw the first Session of the new National Younger Leadership Groups. Over 100 students getting together on a national scale - developing their own leadership skills and discussing areas such as Diversity, Social Justice, the Environment and Growing Faith.

We had a strong response in our Diocese to take part in this new venture, making young voices heard in the Church's strategic planning and thinking is so important. We'd like to thank the staff and pupils for giving up their time and energy to represent us in this way. We're excited to see the impact this will have and will look to share what is going on with you all in this bulletin.





National Younger Leadership Groups 2020-21 Invitation

'The Blessing Song'

The background to the song was that it was written shortly before lockdown began. It then became a bit of a global Christian hit with each nation recording their own version and sharing it. The lyrics are from Numbers 6 (Moses is leading the Jewish nation in the desert and God gives his brother, Aaron – the chief priest – this blessing to say over the Israelites):

**'The Lord bless you and keep you,
The Lord make his face to shine upon you and be gracious to you;
The Lord turn his face towards you and give you peace'**

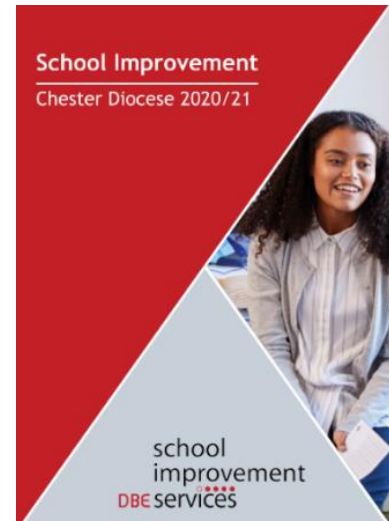

News from Schools

Frodsham C of E Primary School

Everyone enjoyed an Advent Spiral Service celebrating the lights of hope, joy, peace and love in our world.

All the children made a Christingle to take home and the spiral of light grew as pupils thought about different people in the community.



Hoole C of E Primary School



During Advent everyone explored the message of the Angels- 'Do not be afraid'. The school has strong links with the local church, All Saints' on the Groves who have also been following the same theme in Sunday worship. Due to Covid-19 the Church Team worship was delivered by video exploring the messages of the Angels and the theme of Hope. They thought about when the angel appeared to Zechariah (Lk 1:5-25) to Mary (Lk 1:26-38) to Joseph (Matt 1:18-25) and the shepherds (Lk 2:8-20)

To encourage the children to connect with this learning, they were invited to take part in a competition to make an angel out of different plastic bottles and by recycling items, everyone was amazed at the contributions.



Some of the larger contributions were featured in the Nativity Video. The winners were chosen by the local Vicar Reverend Sam Durdant- Hollamby.

The Ethos team and a couple of staff members also collaborated to create their own sculpture from plastic bottles and willow to remind all who pass the front of school of the message of hope this Advent.



Pupils recently jumped into action in response to a call to help a local resident celebrate a special birthday. The school was contacted by the neighbour of an elderly resident who was due to celebrate her ninetieth birthday asking if pupils could help to make her birthday special. Children accepted the challenge immediately and created an array of brightly coloured birthday cards to help to bring a birthday smile. In addition to the birthday greetings, the school sent a birthday package of biscuits and treats to celebrate the special day. The local resident was also sent a VIP ticket for future events at the school once COVID restrictions are lifted.

In addition to supporting local projects in the area, pupils created Christmas cards that were distributed to people in the local area who were lonely over the festive period.



Mollington St Oswald's C of E Primary School

In November, St Oswald's had a Biggest Story day looking at the different concepts from the Bible. This was the culmination of a series of weekly worships looking at each of the concepts in turn. The children looked at the Biggest frieze piece of artwork to see what they noticed and then in groups worked together to create a panel each for a larger display in the hall. Lots of different art techniques were used and it was great to hear the advanced use of language related to the Bible concepts being used in all classes.

The day ended with a sharing session on remote technology so that each bubble could celebrate the work they had done. It was a great day!



Stretton St Matthew's C of E Primary School

Pupils enjoyed a very first spiritual afternoon at the end of November. During the spiritual afternoons, the children are provided with opportunities to develop the four elements of spirituality half termly. Last half term they focused on the element of 'self'. The children reflected on what makes them



truly happy, why they are special and knowing right from wrong. They discussed their gratitude for the things they have and the person they are. The children shared lots of thoughtful contributions and ideas with their classes. It was a lovely, relaxing afternoon and a special time to explore, express and share feelings. Everyone is already looking forward to the next spiritual afternoon in the spring term.



Wharton C of E Primary School

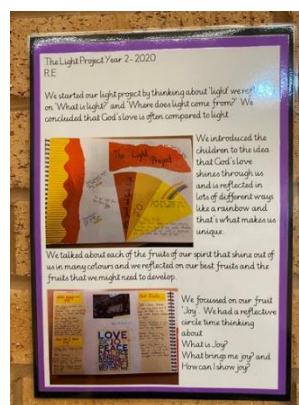

Woodchurch C of E Primary School



Year 5 class are working hard to promote a positive reading culture in school. Part of this is to put in place a Reading Shed on the school grounds to help them do this, they have been looking for ways to raise money to help make this happen.

Year 5 children took ownership of a Recycle 4 School clothes bank. Recycle 4 School is a free fundraising scheme that helps schools, and other organisations, to raise funds in a way that is eco-friendly and educational, developing our pupils' awareness of textile recycling while at the same time raising funds for school.

The children have started collecting good quality unwanted clothing by encouraging parents, children, and staff to recycle their unwanted items. Hopefully it won't be long before they have enough funds to have a Reading Shed, a special place for children to go to read during break times.



No Pens Day



A No Pens Day was recently held. The day was a focus on Oracy skills and the importance of listening and talking and communication.

There were a variety of activities across the school including performance poetry, teaching each other new skills and games, working as a team on jigsaws, drama linked to a class text, practical science with findings shared orally and more unusual activities like British Sign Language Finger Spelling

Both staff and children found the day fun and engaging with lots of new learning taking place.

Arts Project

During Autumn Term the school Arts Project captured pupils experience of COVID 19 and lockdown. The children looked at the work of a range of artists including Anthony Gormley and Kelsey Brooks to see how experiences and feelings can be captured visually. The sequence of learning involved developing skills and experimenting with a range of materials and mixed media whilst at the same time investigating effects that impact on the eye and help convey a specific idea.

The children wanted to express the impact of isolation with a central human image immersed in a cold, blue background. They then chose the warm shades and tones of yellow, orange and red to emanate from the centre in order to represent love, hope and reaching out. Each panel was done separately before being combined to show how we came together as a family to support children, parents, carers, families, and each other.
