Pray with us

As we approach Pentecost we are encouraged, once again, to join with millions around the world praying 'Thy Kingdom Come'... and how urgently we need to pray this.

Maybe we feel this need especially after the year we have just inhabited. Issues like isolation and loneliness have been very evident, alongside financial challenges and physical or mental health questions that have accompanied so many during lockdown. I love the way that the archbishops are encouraging us to reflect on Luke 15 and those pictures of God as a tireless and persistent searcher. We are called to think of five people to pray for in these next days, that they might come to know the love of Christ for themselves. Pray, like the shepherd searching for the lost sheep, for those who have realised during the pandemic that they might be part of Christ's flock. For people who have joined us online, that they might continue to grow in faith and fellowship. For those who have received practical help, that they might be drawn into rich fellowship that feeds the whole person in God. Pray, like the woman searching her home for a lost coin, for those already in the church but who have really struggled over the last year. Thy kingdom come!

As we pray, we also need to reflect the last year we have had in the diocese; a really good year in so many ways, but a challenging one


too. We have been confronted with our past failures in safeguarding. We have been challenged about our institutional racism. We have faced these, and so many other things whilst not being about to meet, and having constantly to reimagine how we can be church in the image of Christ. It has been an interesting time to arrive in the Diocese, not least with the loss of Bishop Keith due to his retirement in March. How do you pray 'Thy kingdom come!' when times are challenging without resorting to simplistic formulae?

I ask, because I find there is great richness here. When we get beyond the polite 'stuff' of prayer and get into the real wrangling, naming how things appear to be and holding them in the open... that's when grace gets to work and I come out changed. The Lord is far from finished with us yet, and His future unfolds as His kingdom comes and His will is done. So pray with us.

What is it all about?

hy Kingdom Come" is a line from the prayer which Jesus taught his followers. It is this line that give this global initiative its name.

Since its start in May 2016 God has grown Thy Kingdom Come from a dream of possibility into a movement. Christians from 172 countries and over 80 different denominations and traditions have taken part.

It is hoped that everyone who takes part will:

- Deepen in their own relationship with Jesus.
- Pray for five friends or family to come to faith in Jesus.
- Pray for the empowerment of the Spirit that we would be effective in our witness.

More specifically for 2021, and considering the impact of COVID-19, the special focus this year is to pray for five people to know the love of Christ from within two groups of people, reflected in the parables of the lost sheep and the lost coin.



Lost sheep in the wilderness

This year we are asked to pray specifically for those who are far off, but, for whatever reason during the last year, have tasted what Church is like for the first time. Perhaps this is through attending an online service, or receiving a food parcel, or having asked for prayer. Let us pray that they come to know the love of God through lesus Christ.



Lost coin in the house

We are also asked to pray for those who are near, who are already in church, but have drifted away during the last 12 months or so, for one reason or another. These are people who are lost in the church. Let us pray that they too come to know again the love of God through Jesus Christ.

Anti-Racism Taskforce calls for urgent changes

The Archbishops' Anti-Racism Taskforce has published its report From Lament to Action proposing a suite of changes to begin bringing about a change of culture in the life of the Church of England.



<u>"Take the vaccine when offered"</u>

The Chair of the Race and Ethnicity Forum in the Diocese of Chester has voiced concern at the statistical trend indicating a lower vaccine uptake in areas of the country with a larger proportion of ethnic minority people.

What is the biodiversity of your churchyard?

Hundreds of churches have signed up for a week-long 'nature count' occurring this summer, which will encourage people to record what they see within the "National Park" of churchyards we enjoy.
