## **Good news!**

This is our penultimate DBE Bulletin of the school year, and what a year it has been! Our schools successfully navigated the reintegration of all pupils back in September following the first lockdown and then overcame further lockdowns during this school year, as well as managing the distribution of free school meals and determining how best to allocate catch up funding to name just a couple of key issues that put schools in the national spotlight.

Despite the many challenges, our schools have continued to shine throughout the year and have enjoyed spreading 'good news.' This month is no exception with the DBE Bulletin being published in two parts, with a separate special 'school news' edition. It includes a feature on Marple All Saints' being the first school in the Diocese to receive the Church & School partnership award, something we hope to develop and make available to other schools in the new year. There is much to celebrate and be thankful for across our family of schools.

Schools are being encouraged to take part in Thank You Day' taking place on Sunday 4<sup>th</sup> July. A chance to get with our neighbours, communities and families, to mark what has happened, celebrate the spirit that got us through and say thank you. From family members to key workers, good neighbours to volunteers, delivery drivers to teachers – we've all got somebody to say thank you to. ## **Admissions**

Important information for Voluntary Aided schools and academies – immediate action to be taken.

As indicated in previous bulletins a new admissions code is due to come into force on 1<sup>st</sup> September. The draft code is currently laid before parliament and is expected to have final agreement by 1<sup>st</sup> July. We will update our guidance appropriately with most changes coming into effect for admission arrangements and process for 2022 and 2023 however there is an immediate change required for both 2021 and 2022 admission policies with regards to Looked After Children. From 1<sup>st</sup> September Paragraph 1.7 of the new Code will require that highest priority is given to "looked after children and all previously looked after children, including those children who appear (to the admission authority) to have been in state care outside of England and ceased to be in state care as a result of being adopted".

The wording used in the code that can be cut and paste into your arrangements is: Looked after children and all previously looked after children, including those children who appear (to the admission authority) to have been in state care outside of England and ceased to be in state care as a result of being adopted. Previously looked after children are children who were looked after but ceased to be so because they were adopted (or became subject to a child arrangements order or special guardianship order).

This new provision will necessitate variations to determined admission arrangements to take effect from 1 September 2021. Admission authorities will need to vary their admission arrangements for 2021/22 (which would have been determined by 15 February 2020) and their admission arrangements for 2022/23 (which would have been determined by 15 February 2021). Without these variations, admission arrangements that have already been determined will no longer comply with the Code from this date. This means it will be in place for any in-year admissions for 2021 and may impact waiting lists if any children on the list come under this category.

Therefore, the DfE expect admission authorities to hold a meeting sometime between now and 31 August 2021 to determine the necessary variations to admission arrangements for 2021/2022 and 2022/2023. Variations will be conditional on the Code passing through its Parliamentary process (i.e. a date on or around 1 July 2021). If any variations are agreed before then, they must be expressed to be conditional on the Code passing through Parliament (as set out in the Board minutes). As this is a requirement there is no need to consult or request a variation through the schools adjudicator. All such variations should come into effect on 1 September 2021.

### Other amendments

Other changes to the code that do not require variation but will need action to be taken include:

• In-year admissions – LAs may co-ordinate in-year admissions and admission authorities have the choice as to whether or not to use the LA. Schools must inform the LA by 1<sup>st</sup> October this year and 1<sup>st</sup> August in every subsequent year whether or not they are going to use the LA's co-ordination scheme. If schools choose not to then the application process must be

published on the school website with all relevant forms required. All schools must publish on their website by the 31<sup>st</sup> October 2021 and 31<sup>st</sup> August every subsequent year how in-year admissions will be managed.

- Schools must inform the LA of any places in their schools regardless of whether they use the LA to co-ordinate in-year admissions or not.
- Parents must be notified of the outcome of the application ideally within 10 school days but no more than 15 school days (a reminder here that unless there is a place available with one application and the child must be admitted decisions on admissions must not be undertaken by a single individual but by the governing board or admissions committee).
- There are changes to the Fair Access Protocol which means that it may only be used where it has been difficult to place a vulnerable and/or hard to place child (this now comes with clear definitions) in-year. No school is expected to take a disproportionate amount of such children.
- All admission authorities must participate in the Fair Access Protocol once agreed.

Alongside the changes suggested by the Church of England Education office following the OSA exercise last year (highlighted in the previous bulletin) and the new code this is a good opportunity to reflect and review on your policy for 2023; to ensure it fits your vision and the community you serve. Many policies have continued as they as they have been inherited but may not serve your current context. Considering this now gives time for the required consultation period in the autumn term. This is also a reminder that policies should be sent to the DBE **before** they go out for consultation. This is a requirement of the code but is also a good opportunity for the policy to be checked to ensure it is compliant.

## **Leavers' Service 2021**



We are delighted to give you some information about the 2021 Year Six Leavers service.

Normally by now we would be well on our way with our planning and preparation for our year six leavers' services in the Cathedral and also at St Mary's, Astbury. Although we know there is a roadmap to lifting restrictions, we are very aware that these plans may change depending upon circumstances at the time and that in early July schools may still wish to show some caution as to the events they attend and the number of schools they mix with.

To this end and, wanting to ensure we have something in place that won't be at risk of last minute cancellation, we have made the decision to offer our year six leavers' service online, premiering on **9<sup>th</sup> July at 9.30am** through a secure YouTube link. Obviously we would prefer to meet together and sing in person but one of the benefits is the fact that we are not limited in numbers and there is no

need for people to travel long distances or attend different venues so we can all be worshipping together even though we are apart. The theme this year will be **Hope**. Details of the log in will be sent nearer the time but we hope that you can add the date into your diary (don't worry if it clashes with something else as we will make it available for you to enjoy after the premier). In the meantime, we would appreciate your help in preparing your year six ready for the service in a number of ways.

**Banners or pictures** – when we meet in person, we normally have a procession of banners completed by the children to celebrate their time in school. # **Keeping on Track (KoT)**

## Supporting our schools to be Deeply Christian in Serving the Common Good



Over the last half term, these visits have been part of the agenda for discussion at the Headteachers' cluster meetings and we felt it valuable to clarify the nature and purpose of them for all who may have been unable to make these meetings, or who would like a reminder. For those longer serving HTs, you may remember our lovely advisor Gail Fullbrook and her visits to support your schools in the inspection cycle. The Keeping on Track visits are designed to replace these in a way that will continue to serve our schools well.

Keeping on Track is a team of trained advisors, (some of whom have expertise as a SIAMS inspector), who will meet with you for a half-day 'light-touch' evaluation visit. It is not an inspection! Rather,

it is an opportunity to review your progress, look forward to the following stage of development and prepare for the next SIAMS inspection.

The visit consists of a variety of activities. These may include discussions with leaders, staff, governors and clergy, an ethos learning walk, conversations with pupils and sharing in collective worship. A brief report will be prepared following the visit.

As we know, the SIAMS schedule (2018) elevates the importance of the school's vision. It also

precises what it means to be an effective Christian learning community. The emphasis is on the <u>impact</u> of provision that is driven by your distinctively Christian vision. It also provides a framework within which individual schools can answer for themselves, 'What is the work of God in this place?' A KoT visit is designed to enable you to explore, review and reflect on these and discern where you are on the journey through supportive conversation.



The events of the last year have meant that we took the decision to postpone many of these visits to allow for our schools to respond to the direct needs of the time. It's been wonderful to observe how your Christian distinctiveness has shaped this. Thank you for all that you have and are doing in our schools. With confirmation that inspections will resume in the Autumn term, (more information to follow for those in the window,) we will look to reschedule our KoT visits, recognising that this is not the ideal mid-way point for many but nevertheless a useful tool in preparing. We hope that you will look forward to your visit as and when it is arranged, and we know that you will benefit from the objective and caring support from one of our amazing team of advisors.


