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### **Remembering the Queen**

The start of the school year began with the sad and unexpected news of the Queen's death. The period of mourning that followed enabled our schools and churches to hold special collective worship services to commemorate the Queen's life and to acknowledge and give thanks for her long and dedicated service to the nation and God.

Only four months earlier, the country, including our schools, held their own events and celebrations for Her Majesty the Queen, as she became the first British Monarch to reign for 70 years and in doing so, celebrated her Platinum Jubilee. In the tributes that have been made since the Queen's death, there have been many that recognised and referenced her strong Christian faith. One recalled a Christmas Day message in which the Queen described how,

"the life of Jesus Christ... is an inspiration and an anchor in my life. A role model of reconciliation and forgiveness, he stretched out his hands in love, acceptance and healing. Christ's example has taught me to seek to respect and value all people, of whatever faith or none."

A message that I hope resonates for all who attend and work in our church schools, as we too can find our inspiration in the good news of Jesus, and the reassurance and ever constant we receive in his steadfast love and grace.

Together, we seek to build school communities on dignity and respect, in which every member has a sense of belonging and is valued for who they are. Our Queen, in her dedicated service to our nation, was a real example of someone who lived life in all its fullness and exemplified how to live well with one another.

### **Headteacher & Senior Leaders Conference 2022**

### **Governor Liability and Deferred Payment Changes**

Following an audit and a resulting change in accounting practices the Board of Education is no longer able to cover any shortfall of either project costs or governors' 10% contribution as we have sometimes done in previous years for exceptional circumstances.

This means that the Board of Education (in line with other DBEs across the country) will now request the full amount of the governor's 10% contribution at the outset rather than half at the beginning and half at the end of the project. Unfortunately it also means that we are unable to allow schools to defer payments of projects.

Please ensure when you are discussing projects with your building consultants and governors that you have the finances available to cover both the costs of the project and the governor's 10% contribution.

Building consultants have been informed of the situation.

We are sorry that this comes at a time when we know costs are increasing but we must ensure we are compliant with modern accounting practices and the laws that govern them.

### Admission Appeals – new code

The Department for Education have just published a new Admission Appeals code which came into force on 1<sup>st</sup> October.

The code can be found here:

School Admission Appeals Code 2022

The code allows for appeals to be heard in person or remotely.

As a reminder, appeal panels **must** be independent of the governing board and appropriately trained. VA schools/academies may choose to use an external provider such as the LA to manage the appeals process. LAs must give VA schools appropriate finance to cover appeals (academies receive this directly).

### **Global Neighbours Scheme**

From recycling, saving energy and walking to school pupils and staff at Bollington St John's Primary School have been working hard to take their place as global citizens.



Bollington St John's Church of England Primary School has achieved Bronze Award status in Christian Aid's <u>Global Neighbours scheme</u> in recognition of its wide-ranging steps to love their global neighbour.

The accreditation scheme celebrates schools that are helping pupils learn about global poverty and the Christian responsibility to tackle it, as well as giving them the tools to play a confident part in creating a fairer world.



Headteacher, Melanie Walker, said: "We are thrilled to be recognised for the work we have done as a whole school community to raise awareness of the extreme inequalities across our globe and perhaps more importantly, the steps we can take to address these. The pupils learn about global issues regularly and gain an understanding of injustice in our world. Our Ethos Group and School Council have written to local shops including Tesco to question them on their policies and practice relating to exploitation and injustice, linked specifically to climate change.

"We have a link with schools in Uganda, China and Romania. Pupils in Romania have worked with our pupils learning about the Sustainable Development Goals, making Plastic Pledges together. This work was shared with town councillors and the mayor who likewise made pledges. Pupils have been learning about examples of people who faced adversity and overcame this to be courageous advocates for change. These stories have challenged the whole school community to think about how each of us can make a difference in our local community and globally."

Alison Brown, Global Neighbours Schools Programme Officer at <u>Christian Aid</u>, said: "The Global Neighbours Scheme was launched in partnership with the Church of England's Education Office with a vision of helping young people understand more about the inequalities in this world and helping them to become courageous advocates for those who have no voice.

It's wonderful to see how staff and pupils at Bollington St John's have taken this to heart and are seeking to tackle injustice.

"Christian Aid is also looking to recruit more volunteer teachers locally to go into schools to help us deliver the scheme. If you have experience of working with children and are excited about inspiring a new generation of agents of change, we would love to hear from you!"

Any primary school in England can join the Global Neighbours scheme. There are three levels of accreditation: bronze, silver and gold. These are verified by independent assessors, who look for evidence across five areas: school leadership, teaching and learning; collective worship and spiritual development; pupil participation; and community engagement.

The Young Leaders Award (YLA) should now be referred to as the **Archbishops' Young Leaders Award (AYLA)**.

### Letters for Creation Exhibition at Chester Cathedral

Special invitation for Schools to exhibit at the Letters for Creation Exhibition at Chester Cathedral, February, 2023 : Plus celebration event on Thursday 16th February.

Christian Aid, Chester Cathedral and Saighton CE Primary School and Pre School have joined forces to organise a special event to showcase children's responses to Letters for Creation.

Letters for Creation is an arts-based project to help school communities raise their voices on the issue of climate change. We are being invited to explore why climate change is an issue of justice and to channel the creativity of pupils into an exhibition of climate art that expresses their r planet and its people

concern and hopes for our planet and its people.

We are looking for ten schools to exhibit their responses to this project at Chester Cathedral. Schools may also wish to host their own exhibitions on site or at their linked churches. Letters for Creation will inspire pupils and provide a valuable channel for expressing their thoughts about climate change; this could be through poetry, paintings, letters, music, photography and sculptures. (The displays will be 2D and so some pieces may need to be displayed in the form of photographs)


Christian Aid's website features inspiring lessons plans around climate justice which are designed to explore and encourage dialogue around how we can be courageous advocates for a sustainable and fair future for all. The initiative presents a unique opportunity to engage your wider community and local decision makers too, in ways that really amplify the voices of young people. The children's work will be exhibited from Wednesday 8th February 2023 until Sunday 5th March 2023 and will run alongside Gaia - Luke Jerram's spectacular artwork. There will also be an exhibition of life-sized animals made from recycled materials by artist, Jacha Potgieter.

100 children (ten from the ten different schools) will attend Chester Cathedral for a special celebration event on Thursday 16th February 2023 where they will take part in an opening worship and sing together the creation care song, 'One World'. The itinerary also includes an acetate stained-glass window workshop, 'windows to the world', and children will have time to enjoy the three different exhibitions around the concept of caring for God's creation. highlights from the project and talk about work happening around the world to bring about climate justice. The aim is that the children leave feeling hopeful, inspired and proud of their School's exhibits. The ten participating schools will also be invited to provide some wording explaining their response to the project and how this links with their distinctive Christian vision.

### **Beat - SPOT**

Beat, the UK's eating disorder charity wants to share with you the details of our School Professionals Online Training (SPOT). SPOT is fully funded across the UK and is available to anyone who works within a primary or secondary school setting.



SPOT encompasses interactive e-learning modules where school staff can learn more about spotting the early signs of an eating disorder and how to talk to a pupil who may be exhibiting them. There are spaces to ask questions and get advice from eating disorder clinicians with weekly drop-ins and forums. Additionally, there are downloadable resources on SPOT, including PSHE lesson plans and resources to use within lessons on topics, such as eating disorders, body image, self-esteem, and social media. **On completion of the e-learning modules, a certificate is issued to the user to acknowledge their training!**

### Astbury children walking love around the world: Local community work

Children in Years three and four went harvesting onto the school field. They collected boxes full of fruit; cooking and eating apples and pears. These were bagged up and given to families or offered for a small donation to school. The remainder of the apples were taken to The Old Saw Mill in Congleton for recycling. The apples will be crushed down and made into Congleton Apple Juice. All profits made are put back into the community. Over the years

the project has planted more than 250 fruit trees in Congleton Schools so that each school now has its own mini orchard, a community orchard has been planted on Astbury Mere and now the profits go to fund our energy reduction projects such as the Sustainable Living in Congleton project.
