

Developing Relationships with a Rural Community

Over the last three years, we have worked hard to improve our relationship with parents and the local community as well as improving the reputation of the school within the wider community.

Below are some of the things we have put in place. All simple things, but together they have had a real impact.

Rebuilding relationships with our parents:

- Principal greets the children and parents every morning on the playground, and again at the end of the day.
- Weekly newsletter to inform parents of developments and share news.
- New parents' BBQ each September.
- Parent Council termly meetings where parents can raise questions and share ideas.
- Meet the teachers meetings every September.
- Range of parent workshops over the course of the year.
- Staff support PTA events.
- Our school website and Facebook page are used to inform, share news and celebrate the children's work.
- Listening to and act on parents' concerns. It's vital that they feel listened to. Care is taken to provide feedback afterwards.

Raising the profile of our Trust with parents:

- Ensure parents are aware of the support we receive from our trust, the Rural Church Schools Academy Trust (RCSAT).
- Trust events Ethos Conference, sporting events and trips.
- SEND and Pastoral Managers work across the trust.
- We restructured our governance so each of the schools in the trust have their own local governing board. Members include a reader from St Leonard's our local church, local residents and parents.
- Visible EHT who the children know well.

Improving our relationships with the local community:

- Y6 children deliver Christmas cards, selection boxes and Easter Eggs to some of the houses in the village.
- School regularly contribute to the parish magazine.
- We invite local residents and the church congregation to our church services at St Leonard's.
- Regular services in our local church Bible presentation for our new children, Harvest, Remembrance, Christingle, Christmas Carols, Easter and Y6 Celebrations service. These services are led by the children. Rev Paul welcomes the congregation and ends with a blessing.
- Rev Paul leads worship regularly in school.
- Other vicars and readers from local churches lead at least one worship a term.
- Principal is a member of the village hall committee.
- Support village events Warmingham Wakes, Duck Drive and Harvest Super.
- Children sing and perform some Maypole dances at the Warmingham Wakes each year.
- Our PTA run the BBQ at the Warmingham Wakes for the village.
- Decorate the children's chapel at St Leonard's each Harvest and Christmas.
- Copies of our newsletter are emailed to local residents, governors, directors and anyone who visits the school on a regular basis.

Promoting the school in the wider community:

- Facebook page, which teachers post on regularly.
- Active member of our EIP.
- Share our promotion video on the local community pages on Facebook – especially during the admissions window.
- Support other events locally, such as 'The Big Story' and Christmas Lights switch on at St Michael's in Middlewich.
- Sports' partnerships.
- Share the children's work in the CBD School Bulletin.
